

SECTION B: CRITERION WISE EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Dayanand Education Society, Latur was established in May 1961. Latur, then, was a Taluka place in Osmanabad District. Aspiring students from poor and middle class families could not get any facility for higher education, except for going to Mumbai, Pune or Hyderabad. For a candidate from economically backward family leaving Latur for pursuing higher education was rather dream like. So to make the flow of education reach to the grass root level, to the sons and daughters of farmers and workers community, renowned personalities and business persons like Late. Manikraoji Sonavane, Late. Raja Narayanlalji Lahoti, Late. Chandrashekherdada Bajpai, Late. Madanlalji Biyani, Shri. Shantibhai Shah, Late. Nathmalji Innani, Late. Ranaba Mandade, Late. Ramgopalji Rathi, Late. Tamanappa Utage, Late. Keshavraoji Sonavane instituted Dayanand Education Society in May 1961. In June 1961, under the aegis of Dayanand Education Society Arts, Commerce and Science colleges started functioning. The foundation stone was laid at the auspicious hands of the then Governor of Maharashtra Hon. Shriprakash.

The Society accepted "**aa no bhadra kratavo yantu vishwatha**" (let knowledge from all corners of the Universe come to us) the 14th Mantra from 25th chapter of *Yajurveda* as its Mission Statement. What was a small plant in yesterdays; today it has grown in to a huge tree. Late. Manikraoji Sonavane was the first President and Late. Chandrashekhardada Bajpai was the Secretary. Today Hon. Laxmiramanji Lahoti presides over the Society and Hon. Rameshji Biyani is the Secretary.

"Latur Pattern" in academic field has come into existence by the persistent efforts put in by all the colleges of this Education Society. In June 1961 Arts, Commerce and Science Colleges were together which afterwards were made independent for academic and administrative reasons. Dayanand Science was given independent recognition in 1967 so were Arts and Commerce in 1970. In the same year i.e. 1971 Dayanand Law College was established. In 2009 Dayanand College of Pharmacy was established. Dayanand Education Society, Latur owns 22 acre and 20 gunthas of land. Each college has a separate Principal, Office and administrative system. Each college has a huge independent building on the campus of Dayanand Education Society. The total strength of all five colleges in 2012 goes up to 9720 students pursuing their U.G. and P.G. degree in diverse streams. Research facilities are also available in all the colleges. **Dayanand College of Arts** offers regular B.A., B.A. Animation and B.A. Fashion Dress Design. The college also offers Post Graduate education in English, Hindi and Marathi on Grant- in-aid basis and Music and Public Administration on Non-grant basis. Facility of pursuing M. Phil in Hindi is also available along with the Recognised Research Centers in English, Hindi and Marathi. Almost 50% of the staff are recognized Research Guides in the respective subjects. Center for Distance Education- Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded has also been added into the available facilities. Arts College Library is one of the biggest which possesses over 92,000 books on various subjects. Recently the college has started P. G in Animation and VFX and Fashion Dress Design. The college has also introduced COCs in various subjects.

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The college has as its vision: "*Man making and character building*" and its mission states the core values of imparting quality education in Humanities and Languages to the poor, rural students. It strives to imbibe nationalism, community development, and sense of fellow feeling through creation of casteless society.

The college strictly follows the curriculum designed by the university. For the effective delivery of the curriculum the college asks each member of the staff to prepare the semester plan of individual papers. Almost 10 of the present faculty have contributed in University curriculum development. 02 Of the faculty has been associated with other universities in the capacity of BOS.

The curriculum of self- financed degree courses and that of COCs have been designed by the faculty. The college also runs SRTMU, Nanded Distance Education center. The college has developed a mechanism for sensitizing its stakeholders on various cross cutting issues like gender equality, human rights and environment etc through various association and NGOs.

Linkages have been established with garment industry like Bombay Rayon, Akhil Bhartiya Gandharva Mandal, Miraj and Gramin Janta Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Chalburga. ICT based facilities are adequately used in delivering the curriculum.

CRITERION II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The college publishes prospects which include all the information of admission process. It also carries the information regarding the facilities available, student's achievements various activities of the college, Prize list for students, information of various scholarships available. There is a name list of Management members, teaching and non-teaching staff. For keeping transparency in admission process the time schedule of registration, first second third merit selection list are displayed on the notice board.

The college has students of high percentage seeking admission to the various courses offered by the college. Most of the courses are exclusively available in the college. The admission committee monitors, counsels and creates students' profile with office assistance. Large number of students from backward and economically weaker sections is admitted in the college. The institutional goals and objectives state the development of casteless society and creation of equality among the diverse sections of the society. The college is very much conscious of the inclusion of rural, economically backward and women students.

The college ensures that the students get different scholarships like Government of India Scholarship, Eklavya Scholarship, Maulana Azad Scholarship, Rajiv Gandhi National Research Fellowship, Maulana Azad National Research Fellowship, Various types of Freeships, EBC Facility etc. Facilities like Earn and Learn, Hostels and student aid fund are also made available. There is a provision of faculty sponsored endowment awards and prizes as well as Poojya Chudamani Balasaheb Maharaj Scholarship.

The college has strategies to cater to the needs of diverse students viz. Remedial classes, Add-on courses like translation proficiency, soft skills and personality development, spoken English, department internet facility, NET/ SLET coaching.

The college prepares an academic calendar every year based on the broad framework supplied by the university. All the teaching staff is supplied with DTR (Daily Teaching Report-Diary) in which semester wise teaching plan is prepared well in advanced. Exam committee looks after the schedule of internal examinations.

The college has established IQAC which monitors the overall activities in the college. Result analysis is done at the IQAC meetings. Workshops and seminars on important issues in higher education are arranged under the guidance of IQAC. The IQAC takes review of the infrastructural requirements for different courses. The Departments of Animation and Fashion take strenuous efforts to prepare students for job market. The MNC and other companies arrange online examinations for recruitment. The Departmental faculty prepares the students by applying such tests. At Graduate and Post Graduate level class seminars, class test and oral examination are regularly conducted.

The library reading room contains adequate number of books and magazines for the ready reference of students. A Language Laboratory with latest language learning software is constructed for the development of language skills. A well equipped and resourceful Research Centre is provided to students to pursue their studies and research.

The college has developed technological facilities like SMS software, CMS software, SOUL 2.0 software, computer labs with 175 Computers and latest softwares, spacious Seminar Hall, Laptops, LCD, OHP and CCTV. During teaching- learning various learner centric methods are used effectively. The quality of teaching- learning is monitored by the defined mechanism.

The college has 100% qualified faculty. The management of Dayanand Education Society has constantly maintained the atmosphere of transparency, democracy, participation, encouragement, freedom and protection of all the legitimate rights. For the upward mobility of the faculty the management has also made the policy to sanction lien.

The faculty has undergone the necessary orientation and refresher courses along with the training in teaching allied areas. The departments of English and Animation had organized six days workshop on "Communication and Computer Awareness." The college had organized one day workshop on research methodology. Dayanand Education Society had arranged five days training programme for all the English teachers on the campus "Train the Trainer Programme."

Various faculty members have received awards and recognition for noteworthy academic, social contribution. The college has introduced evaluation of teachers by students through written feedback forms. The teachers have to submit self-appraisal pro-forma every year.

Recently the university has drastically changed evaluation system by introducing semester MCQ pattern for UG at first and second year. Such evaluation pattern helps the students to take up competitive examination confidently at the same time deep level

understanding of the course content is developed in the students. In the subjects like Geography, Animation, Fashion, Music, Psychology, Dramatics and Functional English students are also evaluated through practical. At Post Graduate level the university has semester pattern of 80 / 20. 80 marks evaluation happens at the university level and 20 marks evaluation is at the department level. In the class room discourse the teachers asks questions and judge the level of students' understanding. Evaluation of students also happens through seminars and oral examinations.

In line with the university graduate attributes, the college works in the direction of developing sense of Nationalism, Humanity, Gender Equality, Honesty, Scientific Temper etc. the vision and mission of the college are very much reflective of the same. The college has clearly stated learning out comes which facilitate the college to comply with its mission on the one hand and the National Policy of higher education on the other. The ideals incorporated in the Indian Constitution, Planning commission documents and the objectives of higher education as determined by NAAC also form the base of the college's stated learning out comes. Nationalism, Humanity, Gender Equality, Honesty, Scientific Temper, sports, cultural, leadership, value education etc. are very much reflective in the vision and mission of the college.

The college monitors students' performance and progress regularly through the examination results. The advance learners are provided with extra study material and average/slow learners are given counseling individually. Remedial coaching is offered for the slow learners, thereby enabling them to overcome the weakness and realize the strength and potential. The college has consistently maintained track record of meritorious students. To help the students to succeed in competitive examination the college has started Dayanand Competitive Examination Study Center. 105 Students have enrolled in it and 11 Students have qualified. Different COCs definitely help the students to secure good jobs. As for research aptitude the college has 03 recognized research centers (English, Hindi, Marathi) 82 research students are pursuing their Ph. D research at our center and 18 research supervisors are associated with the research center. 73 Research Student of this center have already been awarded degrees. In M.Phi.(Hindi) over 100 students have completed their research and presently 08 research guides are available.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

The Institution caters for the excellence in research. It has research centers affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathawada University, Nanded for M.Phil. Programme in Hindi and PhD Programme in English, Hindi, & Marathi. The research committee of the Institution monitors and addresses the issues of research. The research scholars are facilitated with necessary print and on-line resource materials. Many of the faculties of the existing staff have completed their M.Phil /PhD programmes using the resources made available by the research centre. The Institution offers autonomy to the principal investigator regarding the optimum utilization of the grants sanctioned as per the guidelines of the funding agencies. The Institution has a well-equipped library and reading rooms. The Institution makes available all these resources to the investigator. Departmental libraries, ICT facilities have been provided to the researchers. 16 out of the total 19 regular faculties, (i.e 84.21%) of the institution hold PhD Degree. The 03 faculties are pursuing their PhD research. 08 faculty members are recognized research guides of SRTMU, Nanded. 06 faculties are engaged in the Minor Research projects funded by the UGC, WRO, Pune and SRTMU, Nanded.

The institution takes keen efforts on capacity building in terms of research and imbibing research culture among the staff and students through arranging conferences, seminars, workshops, and PhD Course Work Programmes. The Institution at present has 18 Research Guides and 79 Research Students associated with its Research Centers in English, Hindi and Marathi for the PhD programme. For M.Phil. programme in Hindi there are 08 Research Guides and 15 research students. The fees from the research students is utilized for procuring facilities for the research purpose. The budget allocated by the College for the PG programmes is utilized for the research facilities. The grants sanctioned by the UGC under various schemes are also utilized for the research facilities. The Institution has facilitated all departments with Computers with Internet facility. The Institution has a well- equipped library with over 920000 books, and large spacious reading rooms. There is a provision of departmental libraries. The library has a very good collection of books, reference books, magazines, journals, CDs, and DVDs. There are separate cubicles for the researchers in the library. The Institution encourages its staff and students to make optimal use of the equipment and research facilities of the institution

The staff members are encouraged to participate in various activities related to consultancy services. The research center of the college offers consultancy in conducting research. It offers consultancy through PhD Course Work programmes. The unit of Competitive Examination Preparatory Guidance Cell offers consultancy in preparing for various competitive examinations. The revenue is generated from the fees collected from the students. On campus consultancy is offered to the students regarding placements, job opportunities, career guidance, free training in soft skills, gender sensitization etc. These are not paid services. Hence, no income generated.

The Institution has adopted the slum area at Ramgirnagar, Latur. It has facilitated Library for the residents of the area. The Institute undertakes various programmes like training course in sewing for women, free medical check-up camps and free medication, environment awareness, financial aid for the surgeries of the children born with physical disabilities and various social activities. The Institution has facilitated free water-tankers to the areas suffering from acute scarcity of water during the summer of 2013. It has facilitated a spacious public jogging track. It has a spacious, ultra-modern auditorium which is offered for various social activities with minimum charges. The Institution encourages the students to participate in various competitions like debate, elocution, essay writing etc organized at different level. The students are provided with the necessary facilities to participate in various sport events. The Institution has a good track record of award winning sportspersons.

The institution plans and organizes its extension and outreach programmes like free medical checkup and medication camps, blood donation camps, tree plantation, environment awareness, gender sensitization etc through various portfolios of the institution like NSS, NCC, Nature Club, Yuvati Kalyan Mandal, Students' Council, Kala Vahini etc. It makes use of its resources along with the funds of the NSS and NCC units for conducting such activities.

The institution works out outreach and extension programmes like blood-donation, free health check-up camps, hygiene awareness, gender sensitization, plastic eradication, environmental awareness etc jointly with various local institutions like Bhalchandra Blood Bank, MIMSR Institute, Latur Municipal Corporation, Rotary Club, Bhartiya Stree Shakti, Nari Prabodhan Manch, Gramin Janata Shikshan Prasarak Mandal,

Chalburga, etc. The Institution has collaborative arrangements Gandharv Mandal for various programmes in Music. It has collaborative arrangements with Gramin Janata Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Chalburga for various social outreach programmes.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The institution has a lush green spacious campus of 22.5 acres in the heart of the city. The campus accommodates various colleges of the Dayanand Education Society, Latur. Over 6 acres of area has been utilized for the playgrounds. The Society has constructed shopping complex, a spacious auditorium, canteen, and adequate parking slots. The institution through IQAC timely assesses and upgrades its infrastructural facilities like adequate number of classrooms, library resources, reading-rooms, information spaces, playgrounds, hostels, various units like NSS and NCC and strives to keep them in line with the growth and need of the changing scenario. The recommendations are approved by the LMC and adequate measures are taken up. In order to create and enhance the infrastructure that facilitates effective teaching and learning, the policy is framed according to the strength of students and faculties. The college building comprises of class-rooms, store room, staff room, N.C.C.room, sports room, ladies room, language lab etc. The students are provided other amenities like pure drinking water and clean toilets. The noteworthy feature of infrastructural amenities is that our college has a well equipped and spacious library building. It has a rich collection of useful textbooks and rare reference books.

The institution strives to update its faculty with the latest happenings in the field of education. Taking into account the role of ICT in teaching-learning processes, the Institution has equipped every department with Laptops, and computers with Internet facility. E-access to the libraries, books and journals, articles and primary and secondary resources regarding the subject topics have been used by the faculties along with the library resources. This has been helping teacher-student community to keep themselves abreast with the latest developments in the respective domains of knowledge.

The College has 25 well equipped and spacious class rooms to facilitate academic activities. The rooms are well furnished. The College has ICT Classrooms with the provision of LCD Projectors, Multimedia learning, and internet access. Some

programmes of the college like Fashion Dress Design, Animation and Web Design, English spoken classes have separate Computer labs. All the Departments are equipped with Computers and Internet facility. The College has a well furnished seminar hall. The students of all departments are promoted for active involvement in seminars and Group Discussion. The College has well equipped laboratories for some departments like music, Geography, Fashion Dress Design, Animation and Web Design, and Language Lab etc.

There are 16 Subject wise Departments to cater for the need and support of the students outside the classrooms.

The Sports Unit is one of the strongholds of the College. It has a bright track record of excellence in sport events at various levels. The College has spacious play grounds, Tennis Courts and adequate facilities for indoor and outdoor games. The outdoor games like Cricket, Kho-Kho, Football, Volleyball, Hockey, Long-Jump, High-Jump, Triple-Jump, Hammer Throw, Javelin Throw, Hand ball, Short Put, Kabbadi, Wrestling, Ball Badminton, Disk Throw, Tennis, 200 Mts. Track, etc. and indoor games like Badminton, Basketball, Table Tennis, Chess, Carom, etc. are made available to the students. The well equipped gym is in progress. The Parent Institution has a spacious, modern, well equipped and up-to-date technology enabled auditorium with a seating capacity of around 1000. The College uses it on various occasions like seminars, conferences, workshops, and cultural programmes etc. The College has an NSS unit of 225 students. The College has an NCC unit. The Cultural activities form one of the special features of the College. The College participates in various cultural events such as youth festivals organized at various levels. zonal and inter-zonal youth festivals. The College has bagged many prizes and especially General Championships of the parent University in the youth festivals. Personality development programmes are run by the College which involve various activities like public speaking and communication development etc. This besides the College faculty keeps on enriching the students with the art of communicative skills. Courses of the Art of Living for teaching and nonteaching staff. Yoga camps are arranged. The Institution has made available all necessary facilities like Sports, playgrounds, Auditorium, Indoor stadiums, cultural activities, library buildings, reading rooms, digital classrooms, language laboratory, well equipped unit for Competitive Exams preparations, women's hostel, canteen etc.

The Institution has taken appropriate measures in ensuring IT infrastructure and

associated facilities in its various departments. The office and the library have been automated. The Departments have been provided computers, laptops with internet facilities. The Competitive Exam Unit and Language Laboratory are fully automated. The Departments of Animation and Web Designing, and Fashion Dress Design have ICT classrooms and e-learning spaces.

The management of the Institution takes appropriate measures from time to time to ensure the physical and learning resources in respect of upgrading and expanding them as per the need and growth of the student capacity and inclusion of new courses. The campus facilities like canteen, auditorium, plantation, internal roads, and playgrounds have been procured by the management of the Institution.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The institution publishes its updated handbook/prospectus annually providing all the information about the College and the courses. It contains the admission schedule, College working days, the fees details, the rules and regulations, the list of the facilities like computer lab, library, canteen, hostel (girls and boys), information regarding teaching as well as non-teaching faculty, cultural and sports activities, scholarships and awards, list of merit students, guests, photos of important events, programs, list of departments and various activities like NCC, NSS, games & sports, etc. The information published in the College handbook/prospectus is also updated on the College website <u>www.daclatur.org</u>.

The College provides the academic needs of the students belonging to this area. The institution provides the support facilities to its students belonging to SC/ST, OBC, physically challenged and the economic backward sections and overseas students. The institution provides every possible help to the students aiming to be in civil services. So, it has started Dayanand Competitive Exam Study Centre. Our College has a special concern for the health and hygiene of the students. Hence, the College regularly organizes check-up camps where local doctors visit, examine and keep a strict watch on the health of the stakeholders. The College regularly conducts Personality Development Programmes that develop the communication skills of the participants. The College also invites guest speakers to inform the students about employment opportunities. Remedial classes in different subjects are conducted to enhance their skills and competence of

slow learners. The staff members help students to chisel out their artistic and creative skills. So, the College publishes its annual College magazine- 'Vedh.

The institution attracts students to participate in various curricular and extracurricular activities providing necessary facilities, adequate funds, extra guidance and so on. The College has a career counseling and guidance cell to guide students in choosing career and various psycho-social matters of the students. They are counseled to become better human beings and advised to face problems bravely. The institution has a Grievance Redressal Cell. It deals with both registered and unregistered grievances of the students. The College has constituted Yuvati Kalyan Mandal (women cell) to ensure the safety and dignity of female students. The institution takes necessary steps if incident pertaining to mental & sexual harassment takes place. The College has set up the Anti-Ragging Committee to avoid any incident of raging. But no case regarding it is found out up to this date. The College canteen provides food to the students at subsidized rates. Women Empowerment Cell prepares the students to develop a healthy relationship with members of the opposite gender. We haven't registered our College alumni association but the informal functioning of it is going on. The institution is committed to bring down the drop-out rate.

The college encourages the students to participate in curricular and extra-curricular activities such as sports and games, cultural activities. A spacious, 06 acres playground is available for various indoor and outdoor games. The loss of classes and lessons is compensated by giving extra guidance and conducting separate examinations for them. The college rewards the students with cash prizes, awards, certificates and mementos. During last four years, many students of our college participated in state and national level competitions. Ten Students of the college were selected in national cultural competitions ,Tejas Dhumal had been selected for National Youth Festival 2009-10& 2011-12, Balaji Sul & Dinesh Lokhande were selected for national level Youth Festival in 2011-12, 10 Students & a Professor of Our College Played Tabala in Tal Ninad Programme which was recorded in Guinness Book of World Records India, 13 Students of the college were selected for State Level Inter-University Competitions. 02 Students of the college were selected for National Inter University Youth Festival Balaji Sul was selected for National Inter University Youth Festival who achieved second position in mimicry.

The institute gives every possible help to the students for all round development. The institute gives equal opportunity to students to develop their varied capabilities. The College encourages its students to publish materials like College magazine and wall magazines. The College has a Student Council. The College provides them with opportunities to participate in various academic and administrative bodies such as Sports, Cultural, NCC, NNS, Literary Associations etc. The college ensures the best support to our students, thereby helping in their academic and professional progression.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

Institution addresses the needs of society by imparting knowledge to the students by establishing Arts faculty. Highly qualified faculty is available to achieve the vision and mission of the institute. The college constantly tries to inculcate its vision "Man making and character building", its mission "to provide equal opportunities for quality higher education in humanities" and the objectives such as nationalism, brotherhood, sense of fellow- feeling, discipline, regularity, sincerity and punctuality, to create a castles and modern society, to cater to the needs of rural poor and middle class students, to ensure overall development of the students through informal educational means- sports and extra- curricular activities. They are highlighted upon the Website, College magazine and Prospectus.

The Principal of the College has complete autonomy to govern the institution. The various committees prepare action plans and are evaluated by the IQAC. In association with the Local Management Committee, the Principal develops strategies for academic growth on the recommendations of IQAC. Teaching and non-teaching staff members are the representatives of the Local Management Committee. They involve in the decision-making process.

The College tries to reinforce the culture of excellence. As a result of it, in the academic we have university toppers. In the sports, we have university players. Our NCC cadets are selected for RD pared. Our NSS department has been doing well. The cultural department has been achieving grand success every year. Our more than 80% faculty is Ph.D. holders and NET/SET qualified.

To update knowledge and skill, teachers are encouraged to participate in seminars, conferences, workshops and refresher and orientation courses. The departments have been provided with separate well furnished and well equipped rooms. Various methods of teaching, group discussion, field studies, debates, tutorials, seminars, study tours etc are adopted for proper understanding of the subjects. The library staff is well qualified and skilled to update library for the optimum use. The evaluation methods are communicated to the students. NCC and NSS encourage the students to undertake community-oriented activities like social work, health-hygiene awareness, adult education and literacy, blood donation, AIDS awareness, environmental awareness, etc. The institute has well defined grievance redressal procedure.

The management identifies the individual strengths and interest of faculty and accordingly gives responsibilities. It protects the freedom of individuals and appreciates their innovations. Responsibilities of every staff are communicated to them through notices. The institution encourages faculty members to provide resources for training programmes and workshops. The quality faculties are given some authorization to take decisions in certain matters and also allowing them to participate in management activities to retain them. The achievements of faculty members are monitored and updated in the College records.

Management has insured all staffs and students in case of any accident, disability and death. Dayananand College Employee's Co-operative Credit Society Ltd. Latur has been established. Dayanand Kala Bachat Gat is being run opening its account in IDBI Bank, Latur. The financial resources of the College are managed in a very effective and full proof manner. Major financial source for the institution is tuition fee received from non granted programs. Various steps are being taken by the institute to generate additional funds. The College seeks the Contributions made by the M.L.Cs/M.Ps from the L.A.D. funds.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell has been established for the quality assurance. The academic quality of the institution is evaluated on the basis of the performance of the students in their examinations. The poor students are helped by the teachers to improve their academic quality by taking remedial classes and providing books and literature. Various Committees are constituted and well equipped for quality assurance of the institution's administration. The institution has full proof mechanism to get the

academic and administrative machinery of the institution in motion. The administrative utility is maintained by the effective functions carried out by the various committees. The best practices have been promoted continuously to improve the academic and administrative functioning. The examinations are held quite smoothly by the active participation of the staff.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell has two external members Shri. Ramesh Biyani (Secretary of Management) & Adv. Dr. Madhukar Giri (President of Alumni Assocition). They suggested to start self financing courses such as Animation & Web Design and Fashion Dress Design. The alumni members also give suggestions regarding the developments. The suggestions of student council are put before Internal Quality Assurance Cell. The institution ensures that the decisions based on the findings of the IQAC are fully adhered to. The IQAC has been taking students' feedback regarding Library, Canteen, College Campus, Cultural Activities, Games & Sports Activities. The PG departments have developed a format to obtain the feedback of its teachers. The feedback is discussed & is used as a guideline for the development. Attendance is compulsorily taken for every lecture. Counseling is given to slow learners. The institution has evolved a stakeholders' web by forming different platforms like alumni, Parent Teacher Meet and various committees with a fair representation of students.

- Each department awards prizes in the annual social gathering to students securing I and II rank in the respective subjects
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?
- The college collects the data regarding the students at risk of drop out from the mark list of the previous year, class-room learning performance through class tests. Efforts are discussed in the Principal's meeting to find out the reasons behind their slow progress. This information is utilized as a database and these groups of identified students are covered under the following manner:
- a) Remedial Coaching.
- b) A special corpus fund has been raised for Earn and Learn Scheme.
- c) The Principal uses his discretion in issuing some concession in fees.
- d) Some alumni also have financially assisted the poor and needy students.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

- 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)
- In respect of the teaching learning evaluation plan the college has following mechanism:
- a) The college prepares an academic calendar every year based on the broad framework supplied by the university.
- b) All the academic and co-curricular activities are planned in the first meeting of the staff.
- c) All the teaching staff is supplied with DTR (Daily Teaching Report-Diary) in

which semester wise teaching plan is prepared well in advanced.

- d) Departmental meetings regularly take place in which the teaching learning planning is discussed.
- e) Exam committee looks after the schedule of internal examinations.
- f) There is a provision of syllabus completion report. The individual teachers submit the report to the HOD, Head reports to the authority of the same.
- g) The authority checks daily attendance and class engagements.

- The college has established IQAC which monitors the overall activities in the college. Result analysis is done at the IQAC meetings. Workshops and seminars on important issues in higher education are arranged under the guidance of IQAC. The IQAC takes review of the infrastructural requirements for different courses.
- The IQAC has organized 02 day Workshop on Teacher Orientation on New Methods of Teaching and a Workshop on ICT based teaching
- To promote research orientation the IQAC arranges staff academy programmes for paper reading and discussion on various issues.
- The IQAC arranged a workshop for Non- teaching staff.

- The college ceaselessly tries to develop the system of student centric teaching learning system. The required facilities are provided to enhance the learning process in the college. The following facilities given to the teachers and to the students state the college's attempt in the direction of making learning student – centric:
- a) The Department of Animation takes strenuous efforts to prepare students for job market. The MNC and other companies arrange online examinations for recruitment. The Departmental faculty prepares the students by applying such tests
- b) Each department has a separate room with sufficient furniture, computer and internet facility. The college has provided laptops to post graduate departments.

- c) Departments of Animation and Fashion have specious computer labs and with free internet access.
- d) Ph.D., M. Phil and Post Graduate students carry on their project work in consultation with the teachers.
- e) At Graduate and Post Graduate level class seminars, class test and oral examination are regularly conducted.
- f) The Department of English arranged an educational tour to Kolhapur where the students participated in a National Conference on Media and Language. One of our students presented a paper in the conference.
- g) The students in Departments of Animation and Fashion arrange exhibition and workshop where the students' works are kept for public viewing.
- h) The Department of Public Administration arranged a visit to winter assembly session of Maharashtra Government at Nagpur
- i) The Department of History arranges tour and excursion to historical places
- j) The Department of Sociology had arranged a visit to Old Age Home to study their problems
- k) The Department of Political Science arranged a visit to winter assembly session of Maharashtra Government at Nagpur
- The department of Fashion Dress Design arranged an Garment Industry Visit to Solapur
- m) The library reading room contains adequate number of books and magazines for the ready reference of students.
- n) A language laboratory with latest language learning software is constructed for the development of language skills.
- o) A well equipped and resourceful Research Centre is provided to students to pursue their studies and research.
- p) A separate news paper section is provided for readers.
- q) Each department has a library which provides facility for guided reading.
- r) A very resourceful central library with necessary sitting facility as well as relaxed reading section is provided for in-depth study and reference.

- Various guest lectures on rationalism, humanism, scientific temper and creativity are regularly arranged as a part of co-curricular activity.
- All the students of BA III have a compulsory paper of Environmental science where in they write a short project report
- The department of Animation is in possession of Movies and Show-reels, models etc prepared by students
- The Department of Fashion Dress Design has Patterns and models for students self learning.
- Our student Mr. Yogesh Yedke by showing his creativity got a chance to write dialogues for a Marathi film to be shortly realized
- The college has a very strong Cultural Association which has nurtured creative and artistic skills of students. This is very reflective through the consistent winning performance. Our students Mr. Balaji Sul and Miss. Sneha Shinde have already worked in a Marathi film and are doing a few more films
- Mr Rahul Bhalerao and Mr. Balaji Sul are recognized Mimicry artists of state level who are the products of the college
- The college has tie-ups with Gramin Janata Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Chalburga, an NGO. In its collaboration various programmes are arranged.
- The Department of Fashion Dress Design has linkages with Bombay Reyon- a garment company
- The department of Music has linkages with Akhil Bharatiya Gandharv Sangeet Mandal, Miraj

- \triangleright
- The college has introduced evaluation of teachers by students through written feedback forms. Any short comings, if at all, are discussed personally by the authority with the concerned teachers for improvement.
- The teachers have to submit self-appraisal pro-forma every year.
- The students' council also plays active role in the improvement of teaching learning process. All the aspects of teaching learning are freely discussed and suggestions are made. The collected suggestions are subsequently implemented by the college.
- Excellent performance is fully appreciated in the staff meeting.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The college has constantly been emphasizing excellence in quality education, research and extension. Along with this adequate care is often taken to make the stakeholders aware of the evaluation process. The major evaluation is done by the university but as for internal evaluation is concerned the college takes utmost care. All the information regarding evaluation process, schedule and mark distribution is presented in the college prospects. The students are made aware of evaluation system in the initial lectures every year. The college also provides tentative examination dates along with the academic calendar to all the teachers. The college has formed examination committee which organizes, performs and monitors the

evaluation process.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

- Recently the university has drastically changed evaluation system by introducing semester MCQ pattern for UG at first and second year. Such evaluation pattern helps the students to take up competitive examination confidently at the same time deep level understanding of the course content is developed in the students. The college has very carefully disseminated this new pattern to students. BA III year students are evaluated for 40 marks by University and for 10 marks by the College. In the internal evaluation descriptive answer method is used and after the test the answer sheets are evaluated and shared with the students with necessary suggestions and corrections. The college also conducts practice MCQ examination.
- In the subjects like Geography, Animation, Fashion, Music, Psychology, Dramatics and Functional English students are also evaluated through practicals.
- At Post Graduate level the university has semester pattern of 80 / 20. 80 marks evaluation happens at the university level and 20 marks evaluation is at the department level. The students are made aware of this through the prospectus and the initial lectures. For the internal 20 marks the students take 02 tests for 05 marks each and remaining 10 marks are for seminar and paper reading. Additionally all the P G students write a short dissertation for 100 marks out of which 80 marks evaluation happens through University and 20 marks internal evaluation happens through viva- voce examination.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The college has formed an examination committee which implements the university evaluation programme. The committee operates under the supervision of the Principal. The committee is entrusted with the responsibility of planning and conducting the internal examinations. Instead of conducting individual class tests by teachers the college has developed a system on line of university. The evaluated papers are shown to the students and common mistakes are discussed in the class. Particular mistakes are discussed with the concerned students.

- University exams are conducted as per the time table and guidelines of the university. All the staff is involved in the invigilation duty.
- Regular feedback is taken from the students. Such feedback is discussed in the faculty and students council meetings.
- 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.
- The college has initiated in adopting formative as well as summative assessment. Continuous evaluation and its feedback have proved to be a key to success. In the first meeting every academic year the teachers are instructed about continuous evaluation. At the department level the HODs are given the responsibility to carry out continuous evaluation during the course of teaching learning.
- In the class room discourse the teachers asks questions and judge the level of students' understanding. Evaluation of students also happens through seminars and oral examinations. Important questions are always discussed after completion of every unit. This practice has helped immensely to tackle with the greater failure rate due to MCQ pattern with negative marking. The first year results have improved considerably. All in all, all classes college result is better than the University result

- The College has seen its alumni as social, political, cultural and academic leaders. The college is proud to state here that the first Mayor of Latur Municipal Corporation Mrs. Smita Khanapure (Khumse) is our alumni and has served as a contributory teacher in the college.
- The Principal holds meetings and a general framework is communicated to the teachers and they incorporate it in their respective teaching plans. The principal's introductory address states the learning out comes.

- The college monitors students' performance and progress regularly through the examination results. After analyzing the result students are communicated about their achievements and short comings. The advance learners are provided with extra study material and average/slow learners are given counseling individually. Remedial coaching is offered for the slow learners, thereby enabling them to overcome the weakness and realize the strength and potential. Under internal assessment viva-voce, tests and seminars are conducted which tell about students' progress.

- k) Computer Lab, Language Lab and Research lab are made available.
- 1) Information Communication Technology (ICT) is used in teaching and learning.
- m) Tests, Seminars and Tutorials are seriously conducted.
- n) Guest Lectures of experts are arranged regularly.
- o) Interactive Teaching is encouraged.

- e) To help the students to succeed in competitive examination the college has started Dayanand Competitive Examination Study Center. 105 Students have enrolled in it and 11 Students have qualified.
- f) As a good gesture towards students who have enrolled in other colleges and are preparing for competitive exams, they are given library and reading room facility in the Competitive Exam Study Center wing with minimum fees of Rs. 200/- per month
- g) A large number of students have qualified NET/SET from our college
- h) Different COCs definitely help the students to secure good jobs.
- As for research aptitude the college has 03 recognized research centers (English, Hindi, Marathi) 82 research students are pursuing their Ph. D research at our center and 18 research supervisors are associated with the research center. 73 Research Student of this center have already been awarded degrees.
- j) The college has also started SRTMU, Nanded's Distance Education Mode. On our center more than 1000 students who are either employed or those who cannot attend regular classes have enrolled.
- k) Additionally 15 students are registered for M.Phil degree under 08 guides
- The Post Graduate and M. Phil students write their research projects as a part of their curriculum.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The college collects data on learning outcomes from students' performance in annual examinations. A printed copy of Result Record is obtained from the University and it is given to the various departments for their analysis. In the first meeting individual teachers submit their result paper wise and the discussion on the students' performance is done. Students securing distinction and rank in order of merit are congratulated and felicitated. Students who could not do well are sorted out and counseled. When for the first time the MCQ pattern was introduced by the University, the performance of students was not found up to the mark. The authority, HODs and the Examination Committee sat together to sort out the issue

and a strategy of teaching was modified in line with MCQ pattern. After completion of each unit advance learners come up with important questions and they are allowed to share the same in the class. Additionally the teachers prepare own question bank and discuss it in the class. This has resulted in the increase in passing percentage of students. Internal exam results are discussed in the class and common errors are sorted out. At the same time Remedial coaching classes are arranged for weak students.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

- The college has consciously developed a system of monitoring the learning outcomes. This is done at the level of departments through subject wise seminars, tests, tutorials and paper readings. Rigorous teaching practices and learner centered atmosphere helps in monitoring and ensuring the achievements of learning outcomes. Regularity in teaching, timely evaluation and declaration of results, effective library services and availability of study material are some of the methods through which achievement of learning outcomes happens.

- The individual teachers do use assessment as an indicator for evaluating student's performance. Students who could not do well in previous semester examination are made to attend the remedial and bridge classes. Students who did well in the previous examination are encouraged to pursue higher level still. Inputs in the form of incentives like prizes, additional books, scholarship etc. are provided. Students' inclination towards sports, music, elocution, literature etc. is nurtured and suitable opportunities are given for their realization. As a result the students of this college are performing excellent in academic, sports and cultural domains.



- The departments have been provided with separate well furnished and well equipped rooms.





- The achievements of faculty members are monitored and updated in the College records. Performance appraisal system is implemented. The appraisal report of faculty is made by the concerned head of the department on the basis of one's yearly achievements, discipline, quality etc. Then it is submitted to the head of the college.
- The assessment of the teachers also comes through the feedback forms by the students. All the students from each and every class have to do so of all the teachers. The identities of students are not disclosed.
- The feedback form has a well defined set of questions to evaluate the teaching capacity and define how far the teacher has reached out to the students.
- These details are accessible to staff to judge their performance.
- The Principal understands the students' reflections and shares it collectively and individually across the staff. If there are any issues of concern, the faculty member is facilitated to overcome the lacunae without lowering self esteem.
- The annual self appraisal is conducted through participation of the teachers in various College affairs.

- The financial resources of the College are managed in a very effective and full proof manner. There is fully computerized accounts department. Tally software is used. Double entry system is followed to maintain the accounts. The following three types of accounts are created:
- Receipts & Payment Accounts.
- Income & Expenditure Accounts.
- Balance Sheets.

Each and every transaction is supported by the vouchers. All the collections are deposited in the bank and all expenditure, recurring and non-recurring, are incurred through cheques. Only authorized persons can operate through the bank. The two tier system is followed for effective check on the accounts. Internal audit is done perpetually. The external audit is done by the Chartered Accountant after the end of the year. There are three types of payments/expenditures:

- Recurring.
- Non recurring (Prov. Fund, Gratuity, etc.).
- Capital Expenditure.
- A separate budget is allocated to enable the institution for efficient use of the financial resources.

The internal audit is done on regular basis (daily basis) and external audit will be at yearly. Annual audit will be done by the charted accountant. Last audit was done on 18.07.2013. The rectification is attended to the observation by the auditor.

- The various committees implement developmental and academic activities. The Principal supervises the implementation. The fair representation of the learners ensures the transparency in the process.

- The suggestions of the IQAC are fully adhered to. The academic as well as the administrative working is further smoothened by organizing training sessions for its teaching as well as the non-teaching staff. - > The college's approach to the learning outcome assessment is defined clearly.
- Faculty determines the intended educational outcomes of their academic programmes and activities. The outcomes are evaluated by IQAC. The results of Outcome Assessment are used to evaluate the effectiveness of academic programmes and activities, and student services. Faculty uses them to develop and improve academic programmes.
- Attendance is compulsorily taken for every lecture. The student's level is judged by the staff member on basis of the student's participation in the various activities. Finally, appropriate action is taken.
- Counseling is given to slow learners. Parents of such students are called to meet, if required. The students lagging behind are given additional help and guidance.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The institution has evolved a stakeholders' web by forming different platforms like alumni association, Parent Teacher Meet and various committees with a fair representation of students. The management has developed evaluation system for stakeholders to record their opinions, suggestions and objections for constructive development.

7.1 Environment Consciousness:

- The College has a long standing history of 52 years. Since its very inception it has been sincerely contributing in academic, social, cultural and environmental fields. Over the years, the name of Dayanand College of Arts, Latur is recorded with much reverence. In the changing scenario of the world and society the college has contributed in its own way in the Cross Cutting issues like gender sensitivity, equality, environment consciousness, ICT learning, career orientation etc.
- Being a single faculty ARTS college we have a major share in the socio-cultural activities yet our practices in other fields are noteworthy

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

- Yes. Since the very inception of the college in June 1961, the college has been enjoying the campus atmosphere full of greenery. The college is situated in the heart of the city with 22 ½ acres of land. Yet it has maintained greater greenery on the campus as compared to the off campus greenery. There are various types of big trees, lawns and gardens with attractive and decorative trees and plants.
- The total greenery of the whole campus increased immensely during the Golden Jubilee Celebration of Dayanand Education Society in the august presence of Hon. Shri. Pranab Mukherjee, the President of India.
- Under the supervision of The Nisarga Mandal (Nature Club) Variety Garden Developers firm looks after the maintenance of the campus environment.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

The college has been very much concerned regarding its campus development for the suitable teaching- learning environment. In the following areas the college has taken initiatives like:

* Energy conservation:

- The college has been paying huge electricity bills for years but with the suggestion of top Management, the college opted for a double switch system- one at gate and other at the control board. This helps immensely in reduction of electricity bills
- The college has already opted for energy conservation means like CFL bulbs in majority places.
- The college has placed turbo fans in majority of the rooms. This has helped in better ventilation and saved exhaust fan expenditure.

* Use of renewable energy:

- Marathwada has constantly been suffering from power shortage, so the college on IQAC suggestion and LMC sanction installed a Solar Gas Heater in the Girls Hostel.
- During the NSS camps the volunteers and Programme Officers appeal the villagers for the construction of Bio- Gas Toilets and many a times it is taken up by the villagers seriously.
- Special lectures are arranged in this direction in the NSS camps

* Water harvesting:

• The project of Rain Water Harvesting has been implemented on the campus. The roof water is well channelized underground. This has considerably improved ground water table level.

* Check dam construction:

- A Check dam was erected on the river Tawarja with 1000 sand sacs at Ekurga village. The dam was 07 feet tall and it resulted in the check of water over 02 km. The scarcity of water was tackled up to May 2008
- At Kate-Jawalga village, the flow of hill water entering into Dalit Habitat was stored and diverted to other destination so as to save the trouble of Dalit people
- At Ramwadi the NSS unit dug up the lake upto 20 feet and transferred the soil into the farms. It resulted in the immense increase of storage capacity of the lake

* Efforts for Carbon neutrality:

- No Vehicle Day: the faculty unanimously and wholeheartedly accepted the proposal of not using their vehicle on Saturday every week. This practice will surely percolate down in the student community on the whole campus.
- As the college enjoys greater greenery, Oxygen level is better on the campus so it has helped in neutralizing the carbon level.

• The following table indicates our effort of maintaining the campus green:

Trees like Ashoka, Neem, Baniyan, Almond, Gulmohar etc make the whole campus full of greenery.

- All these trees, taken together, emit approximately 148900 kg of Oxygen yearly i.e. 407 kg Oxygen daily
- The college has planted Tulsi Plants which emit oxygen 24 x 7.
- During the NSS camp of 2012-2013 at Malwati, Dist. Latur 100 trees were planted on the campus of the ZP school.
- 2007-2008 NSS Tandulwadi 400 plants on both sides of road, school and Primary Health center.
- The college has also planted many trees in the adopted slum area Ramgir Nagar, Latur

* Hazardous waste management:

- On campus there is an adequate and proper sewage drain system
- For solid waste there is a provision of dumping well/tank. The IQAC has recommended the top Management of developing a bio-fertilizer project there in.
- Our NSS department during all the annual camps at different villages have motivated and

actually worked for a village free from Open Toilet. In this venture the village Head, ZP and other agencies assist considerably. The following table states our success in this direction:

* e-waste management:

The Property Manager of Dayanand Education Society Mr. Katpure in in charge of disposal of all type of waste. The batteries are sold in return of concession price for new one. Shri. Ramdev Computers look after the e-waste of the college.

* Gender sensitivity/ Equality:

- The college has consistently vast number of girl students' enrollment. This is due to the safety and sense of security the college has developed in the students and their parents.
- As a part of our Golden Jubilee celebration we organized a state level marathon with the theme: Women Protection and Honour
- The college arranged HB check up for girl students. When it was found that 60 % of them were anemic they were personally counseled to take nutritional food and vegetables.
- The college has instituted "Yuvati Kalyan Mandal" (Womens Cell) through which various programmes are arranged.
- For girls students during Dashera celebration "Dandiya Competition" is regularly arranged.
- The department of Fashion Dress Design arranged "Fashion Show" to encourage girl students' boldness.
- The college ensures that all the grievances are redressed through the cell
- The college also celebrates Raksha Bandhan every year

- Silence Zone: Dayanand Education Society, Latur has declared and maintains the campus as "Silence Zone."
- The movement of students' vehicles is controlled through the security personnel stationed at the entry gate.
- Counseling: There is a provision of formal and informal counseling for the students
- Cultural: The Department of Music has instituted "Sangeet Kala Academy" through which anybody can learn music.
- There is a provision for Best Dress award during the gathering
- The college has instituted Best Reader award for the students
- Dayanand Education Society in collaboration of Latur Municipal Council has developed 200 meters Walking Track for the locals and senior citizens.
- When there is shortage of blood store in Bhalchandra Blood bank, we arranged emergency blood donation camps on their request.
- After the inhuman incident in Delhi last year our students arranged a rally for Women Protection.
- Our students' involvement in the No Plastic movement of Latur Municipal Corporation was highly appreciated.
- During every summer the city constantly faces water scarcity and DES always comes forward and extends helping hand by providing water tanker.
- The college has adopted a slum area Ramgir Nagar. One child was suffering from organ disorder. When the parents approached the college, the whole staff, students and DES management contributed whole heartedly for the operation expenditure.
- One of our colleagues unfortunately died of heart failure. He was appointed on temporary basis. The staff made sufficient provision for the safety and future of his children by purchasing Life Insurance Policy. Additionally, some amount is fix deposited in the younger child's name.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

- The college has always been on the side of supporting novelty, creativity and innovation. This is reflected through the co-curricular and extra- curricular activities of various associations.
- 1. The college annually publishes its yearly magazine "VEDH." During the staff and students' council meeting an innovative idea was proposed. It was decided to publish the yearly issue with a particular theme
- In the year 2007-2008 the issue was based on the theme of Women Empowerment and Protection.
- In the year 2008-2009 the issue was based on the theme of "Terrorism and Human Rights" The students were encouraged to come out with their views, articles and poems on the issue. This was highly appreciated by all
- In the year 2009-2010 the issue was based on the theme of Youth and Media
- In the year 2010-2011 the issue of Environment was taken as the theme
- In the year 2011-2012 the issue was based on the theme of Dayanand College itself.
- 2. Another innovation was to initiate the staff into research and innovation. This was achieved through the common platform of "Dayanand Staff Academy." Along with the senior faculty members, new comers were assigned the task of reading research papers. This practice resulted in bridging the generation gap and updating knowledge. The presented papers were followed by elaborate discussion on the topic. The college also proposes to publish such papers in book form with ISBN.
- 3. To promote academic and extra- curricular talent the college has instituted Dayanand Shri and Dayanand Shrimati awards (Best student Award Male and Female). This novel practice has boosted the moral of deserving students who strive earnestly for achieving excellence in academic as well as extracurricular activities. There is a special committee which looks after the scrutiny of received applications of students. Score is awarded as

per the performance in exams, sports, NSS, NCC, cultural and allied fields and topper receives the award in annual social gathering.

7.3 Best Practices

- 7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional Objectives and/or contributed to the Quality improvement of the core activities of the college.
- \triangleright
- 1. Empowering Students with Global Skills and helping them for competitive exam preparation.
- **Goal :** The college, being a single faculty Arts college, has been dedicated to the vision : *"Man making and character building"*
- The College endlessly pursues its mission and strives to provide equal opportunities for quality higher education in humanities. One of the objectives the college works states that students should be moulded for global job market. The college had already taken a step by introducing professional courses like Animation and web Designing, Fashion Dress Design and certificate courses in Translation, Soft Skills and Personality Development, Rural Development Administration, Social Counseling and Real Estate Management.
- The top management of DES, Latur, authority and the faculty realized that the students hailing from Marathwada region lag behind in case of excellent communication skills as compared to students of other regions. The curriculum prescribed helps little to inculcate such skills so some extra efforts need to be taken.
- Similarly, students from Maratwada region lag behind in competitive exams due to unawareness. Their financial constrains detain them from joining highly charging classes off campus. Dayanand Education Society assigned our college the task of establishing Dayanand Competitive Exam Study Center to facilitate the aspiring students in their preparation.

• The Context: The IQAC suggested establishing a language laboratory and LMC immediately sanctioned the proposal. Within a year a well furnished and fully computerized Language Laboratory came into existence with full financial support of the Management. Latest language learning soft ware was installed. The English teaching faculties were assigned batches but within a short period we realized teaching general, regular UG, PG classes is very different than teaching Spoken English Classes. When the issue was discussed with the Management they suggested the entire English Teachers' orientation for developing aptitude and Soft Skills Training. A Firm "Maitri Institute of Corporate Training" was engaged for training teachers in the respective area.

For Dayanand Competitive Study Center all the necessary facilities were arranged by the top Management and autonomy in purchase of books was given to the faculty. Experts in competitive exam coaching were consulted and their assistance is sought for coaching students.

• The Practice: The Management of Dayanand Education Society has been always focused on all-round product creation on the campus. The most noteworthy decision came from the Management to train the students from all the colleges on campus without charging them any fees. The principals from all the colleges were asked to select 40 students and send them to the classes.

For Dayanand Competitive Exam Study Center on campus students are charged marginal fees of Rs. 4000/- and in return they avail teaching of experts, library and reading room facility. As a good gesture towards students' community off campus we allow the library and reading room facility by charging minimum fees. If they wish to join classes they are required to pay Rs. 6000/-

• Evidence of Success: This free Spoken English Class was a grand gift to the poor, rural students. It was something like dream comes true. The students of final year found it very appropriate and useful for successfully facing the post- graduate life. The training in Soft Skills and Spoken English helped them in acquiring adequate knowledge to face job

market. Many students secured good jobs after completing their graduation. The Competitive Exam Study Center is in budding stage yet some of our students and teaching staff qualified exams of initial stages.

- **Problems Encountered and Resources Required:** Initially the students were bit reluctant to join the classes due to the reason that first of all it was free of cost and it was to be taught by the same regular faculty. But when they started attending it they enjoyed it. Time schedule was another problem and it was successfully tackled by making certain changes in time table by all the colleges. Train the Trainer programme helped immensely to develop teachers' attitude and aptitude.
- As for resources, the entire necessary infrastructure has been made available by the Management. Human resources from Department of English is used and they are paid Rs. 250/- per session by the respective colleges. Students need not pay any amount for attending the classes. For competitive exam coaching internal and external faculty offer services and receive handsome amount for teaching

The college has very strong Music and Cultural department. It was decided to use this facility as a therapy on pressing unrest in youth.

• The Practice: Through the Music department and Cultural association programmes are arranged for giving opportunity to budding talent. By taking part in various activities/ events students show their potential. The college has collaborations with Ransamrat Kala va Krida Mandal, Latur. To welcome the Hindu New Year a cultural programme is organized every year. Most of the events like classical music, folk dance, folk song, lavani etc are performed by our students. This " *Chaitra Pallavi*" event has always been the attraction for all the locals.

The college has been making successful presentation in University Level Youth Festivals. During last five years our team participated in all the 40 events and won 02 times General Championship and 01 time Runner Up position. The students regularly participate in all the cultural events in the vicinity and win prizes. Through all these presentation the audience is given musical feast. The department of music has linkage with Gandharva Mandal, Miraj. It runs the study center of this mandal which arranges various level exams in music. Over 1000 students are appearing for exams through our study center

• Evidence of Success: such channelizing of youth energy for artistic purposes has resulted in maintaining the campus environment free of negative spread of energy. Winning General Championship for successive times and one time Runner up position has proved very useful in attracting good number of participation for the budding talent. Most of the students were selected for zonal and inter-zonal competitions. Some of our students got an opportunity of working in Marathi movies and some have taken up this as profession. Mr. Rahul Bhalerao and Mr. Balaji Sul are the popular mimicry artist in the region.

We believe that youth energy when channelized in the proper direction yields a good result.

• **Problems Encountered and Resources Required**: for this purpose there is hardly any problem encountered. As for resources required the college has made the necessary facilities available. The department of music is in possession of all the musical

instruments and equipments.

The exit meeting and Peer Team Report were very useful for introspection by the college. Besides criteria wise assessment and remarks the Peer Team had provided an overall analysis on the basis of Self Study Report and actual visit to the college. The Peer Team appreciated the attempts of the college towards quality assurance and standards. The committee appreciated the infrastructural adequacy, cordial relation between Management and various stakeholders, effective leadership and good relationship resulting in efficient teamwork. It also appreciated the strict disciple in the institution regarding assemblies and prompt attendance. It also appreciated the system of monitoring and counseling in respect of academic and personal areas. Students' participation in sports and co-curricular activities and cultural activities was also a matter of appreciation. Dayanand Employees Credit Co- operative Society and its corpus fund were highly appreciated by the team. Besides these aspects of appreciations the committee had given some valuable suggestions for the further development of the institution.

The responsibility of the institution after the first accreditation was to maintain the standards and implement the specific suggestions by NAAC Peer Team.

Accordingly the college has meticulously tried to continue the good aspects recommended by the Peer Team. So far as Post Accreditation initiative regarding the suggestions given by the Peer Team are concerned, the college has fulfilled them in all respects, which can be noted as under:

1. After the first accreditation the college established IQAC cell under the chairmanship of the Principal.

- 2. The committee recommended Alumni Association strengthening. The college has formed such association and formed the formal body. The fund rising has also been started.
- 3. The committee suggested career oriented courses and the college took a greater leap in this regard. We started U.G and P.G. programmes in Animation and Fashion. It also started COCs in Translation, Soft Skills and Personality Development, Rural Development Administration, Social Counseling and Real Estate Management.
- 4. The committee suggested industry interface but the college runs traditional programmes in Humanities and Languages. When the departments of Animation and Fashion were established the linkages were established with Bombay Rayon and other industries.
- 5. Faculty deputation for psychological counseling was recommended and the college introduced COC in Social Counseling.
- 6. Construction of ladies hostel and toilet facilities was suggested and a huge hostel accommodating over 170 girl students was constructed with financial assistance from UGC.
- 7. Study circle for competitive exams was a recommendation and the college started Dayanand Competitive Exam Study Center. Students are given coaching and library- reading room facility by charging minimum fees. Off campus students are also given access to library and reading room with minimum charges
- 8. Language lab establishment was recommended and DES Management with financial assistance by UGC established a well furnished and better equipped Language Lab at the Library building. It has the capacity of 44 computers with latest language learning soft ware. DES Management decided to train students from all the college under its aegis without charging any fees. The students are trained in spoken English and soft skills.
- 9. 02 of the faculty availed FIP and completed their research. Additionally majority of them are actively engaged in research and publication. Some are working on Major/ Minor research Projects funded by UGC and the University. Out of the 19 faculty members 16 are Ph. D holders and remaining 03 are on the way of submission. 08 faculty are Research Guides and in all 18 Research Guides are associated with Research Center.

- 10. Remedial classes have been regularized and given formal shape
- 11. As per the suggestions a slum area and a village have been adopted and constructive work is done in them
- 12. 05 self financing programmes and 05 COCs have been newly introduced during the last 05 years.
- 13. Browsing facility with meager charges is made available at the girls' hostel. Students of Animation and fashion have full internet access in the computer labs. Research students make use of the departmental internet facility.
- 14. Good number of research journals has been subscribed by each department.
- 15. Sports facilities have been further augmented by developing Lawn Tennis ground, Volley Ball Ground, Ground for basket ball. Construction of Indoor stadium is in progress. Cricket stadium has further been facilitated. Our students winning performance in indoor and outdoor games has increased immensely.
- 16. Total campus has been covered under beautification project creating suitable atmosphere for teaching learning and research.



REPORT OF THE PEER TEAM ON INSTITUTIONAL ACCREDITATION OF DAYANAND COLLEGE OF ARTS LATUR-413531 MAHARASHTRA.

Section-1: Preface

Dayanand College of Arts, Latur, Maharashtra, volunteered to be assessed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) and prepared a Self-Study Report (SSR) which was submitted to NAAC in September 2003. NAAC constituted a Peer Team to visit the College and validate the Self-Study Report. The Peer Team consisting of Dr. (Mrs.) M.D. Muthamma Director of Collegiate Education, Bangalore, Karanataka, as Chairperson, Prof. M. Raghavendra Prabhu, former Principal, College for Leadership and Human Resource Development, Mangalore, Karanataka as Member and Dr. (Mrs.) Anne Mary Fernandez, Head of the Department of Economics, Holy Cross College (Autonomous), Tiruchirappalli, Tamil Nadu as Member Coordinator visited the institution for two days on the 21st and 22nd of February 2004. Prof. Banadarangaiah, Academic Consultant, NAAC, Bangalore, was in-charge of the pre-visit preparations.

Dayanand College of Arts was founded by a group of elite citizens of the town belonging to the Arya Samaj in the year 1961. The pioneering efforts of the eminent group of citizen culminated in the raising of Rs. 1.25 Lakhs by the Dayanand Education Society named after the founder of the Arya Samaj, Swami Dayananda Saraswati, after whom the College has also been named. It is heartening to note that the Market committee of the town and members of the farming community took a major initiative in mobilizing the corpus funds to start the institution. Initially, Arts, Science and Commerce Colleges were together and the institution was affiliated to
