1.1 INTRODUCTION

Dayanand Education Society, Latur came into being out of the dire necessity of students and parents who could not afford to send their wards to Pune or Aurangabad for higher education. The philanthropists like Late Raja Narayanlal Lahoti, Late Manikrao Sonwane, Late Madanlalji Biyani Late Chandrashekhardada Bajpai and likeminded people came together and decided to establish Higher Education Institute in Latur that would facilitate people in Latur and Marathwada region. Sumptuous amount could be collected from farmers who donated Rs. 01/- each after selling their produce in the market. Initially, all the three faculties –Arts, Commerce and Science were together but in 1970 Arts and Commerce colleges were given independent status. What was a humble beginning has turned out to be a huge tree. Presently 08 different Institutes run under the aegis of Dayanand Education Society, Latur.

Dayanand College of Arts, Latur right from its inception has been striving to offer quality education to economically backward rural students. We are proud to have vast alumni base working in different sections and divisions in Government and Non-government sectors. Most of the teaching fraternity in the vicinity and the region are our alumni. At present the college offers 07 Post Graduate Programmes and 06 Under Graduate Programmes and Recognised Research Centers in English, Hindi and Marathi recognised by the affiliating university. We are the only single faculty Arts College that offers variety of Programmes. Innovative Programmes like Animation and Web Design, Fashion Dress Design and Administrative Services which were limited to Metropolitan cities, we offer the education in the same.

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

The Curriculum Delivery Cycle of the College :

A) Curriculum Delivery Planning:

- 1. The IQAC develops a policy on curriculum delivery and teaching learning review. An Academic calendar is prepared at the beginning of every Academic Year which covers scheduled academic activities.
- 2. Induction Programme for newly admitted students .
- 3. HODs in the departmental meetings discuss the curriculum planning and Academic calendar. The teaching commences as per academic calendar issued by the Parent University.
- 4. The Sports, NSS, NCC, Cultural and other committees of the college also prepare their annual plan which commensurates with the guidelines issued by the parent University for co-curricular and extension activities.
- 5. The time table committee prepares the master time table based on the individual and department timetables. The time table for all the programs is communicated to the students.
- 6. The timely review of the syllabus completion report from the faculties is obtained.
- 7. The schedule for Continuous Internal Evaluation is communicated to the students.

B) Curriculum Implementation:

The Course Outcomes and the Program Outcomes are communicated to the students at the beginning of each semester and are also displayed on the College website. Teachers maintain the record of teaching plans and daily teaching details in the Teachers' Diary.

The student centric teaching methods such as-Projects, GDs, mock-interviews, seminars, quizzes etc. are used by the faculty. Advanced and Slow Learners are identified in the informal discussions in the initial classes. The advanced learners are facilitated with Gold Card system which enables them unlimited access to the library resources. The slow learners are enabled to keep pace with teaching learning activities through individual departmental counseling sessions. The curriculum delivery consists the activities incorporating cross-cutting issues, experiential learning, fair evaluation methods, extra-curricular activities, and sports for holistic development, review and feedback.

The faculty members integrate student-centric classroom teaching and Innovative Practices in teaching with the use of ICT tools such as computer assisted teaching learning, smart boards, WhatsApp groups, and Google Classrooms. During Covid 19 pandemic countrywide lockdown, the Institution procured Microsoft Teams LMS for the teaching learning activities. The College has recently obtained its own Moodle based Learning Management Software for the effective curriculum implementation.

C) Curriculum Review and Adjustment:

The teaching learning process and it's adherence to the academic calendar is reviewed by the IQAC regularly through the meetings. The feedback on teaching is collected from learners. Review for syllabus completion is taken by the Head of the Department and communicated to the Principal periodically. The feedback on curriculum in online and offline mode is collected from the stakeholders and further analyzed to bring out the suggestions on the curriculum. Academic and Administrative Audit both internal and external is conducted by the Institute periodically.

Continuous Internal Assessment :

Internal Evaluation Committee supervises the process of internal examination.

The University opted for CBCS system in 2016-17 for UG programme. So in the year 2018-19. The first batch appeared for III year. Continuous Internal Evaluation took place as per the University norms. CIE is carried out as per the University norms.

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

For enhancing learning experiences, the faculty adopt innovative and student centric approaches. Available ICT facilities stand as boost for both the teachers and the taught. The methodologies vary subject wise teacher wise yet some common methods are like: lecture method, interactive method, project and field work method, computer-assisted method and experiment method. The teachers use ICT based techniques, the Power Point and e-resource based materials of curriculum delivery. The use of video lectures of experts

available on You- Tube make learning interesting. The Student centric methods are given below:

Project Method: The project work is mandatory for both UG and PG students as per the requirement of syllabi.

Interactive Methods: The teachers make learning interactive by motivating students' participation in Group Discussion, Role-Play, subject quiz, news analysis, questions and answers on current affairs, etc.

Student Seminars: The Students' seminars are organized by both UG & PG departments, Students prepare a write up on contemporary as well as the topics of their interest and present before other students.

Group Learning Method: Group Learning method is now being adopted through Google Classroom, Google Meet, Whatsapp group etc. Teachers and students share their notes study material, projects and assignments through this method.

Field Visits: Faculty identifies and proposes academically significant Field visits and Surveys.

Industry Visits: Industry visits are regularly arranged with the intention of acquainting students with industry work culture and requirements of job market.

ICT Enabled Teaching: ICT enabled teaching includes Wi-Fi enabled class rooms with smart boards, Language Lab, Smart Class rooms, etc. The institution adopts modern pedagogy to enhance teaching-learning process. The institution has the adequate infrastructure and facilities to cater to the needs of faculty members and students. In addition to chalk and talk method of teaching, the faculty members use the IT enabled learning tools such as **PPT**, **Audio- Video resources**, **online sources**, to expose the students for advanced knowledge and practical learning. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The IQAC and Internal Evaluation Committee ensures the timely, effective and transparent conduct of examinations. The internal assessment schedule is planned and conducted as per academic calendar/guidelines of the affiliating university. It is communicated to teachers and students well in

advance. The HoDs look after effective monitoring and timely implementation of the internal assessment and procedure of evaluation, with a predetermined schedule for assignments submission and tests/seminars. After the Department level finalization, the mark lists are submitted to the office. The students are continuously assessed through seminars, tests, assignments. The marks obtained by the students are communicated to them. Grievances, if any, are redressed timely. All record of examination viz. assessed answer sheets of tests, assignments, mark lists are maintained in concerned departments.

The assessment consists of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) and End Semester Examination (ESE). Accordingly, mechanism for redressal of grievances related to examination is developed at two stages - for internal examination (College level) and for university examination (University level).

Redressal of grievances at college level:

Internal Evaluation Committee supervises the process of internal examination. The grievances of students regarding internal examination are dealt in the concerned departments. Complete transparency is maintained in the Continuous Internal Evaluation process. During the period of internal examination, if the students are deputed to attend NSS/NCC/Sports activities, such grievances about their absentee in the internal examination are considered and separate internal assessment is scheduled for such students.

Redressal of grievances at the University level:

The University Examination Committee at college level looks after the grievances of students regarding university examination.

After the declaration of the results, the dates for revaluation provided by the university are displayed on the student notice board for the information.

The students are provided the photo copies of their answer books by the University if they feel under evaluation has happened. On receiving the photo copy, the teacher reassesses the answer book and if there is justifiable grievance of the students, the student is asked to apply for the reassessment to the university. University appoints different examiner for reevaluation. In case of a malpractice in the examination, the university committee calls the student to have a say. The committee's decision is a binding on the student. The procedure for re-assessment as well as providing photo copy is time bound and efficient.

The college and the university have developed a transparent, time-bound and efficient mechanism regarding the evaluation related grievances.

The POs and COs of different subjects imbibe research attitude and rational thinking among the students to make them competent in the world of competition and upgraded recent technologies. The COs of Career Oriented Courses and Skill Enhancement Courses aim to develop entrepreneurship skills among the students. Programmes and Course Outcomes of Programmes offered by the college are displayed on the website. The teachers of the college are actively involved in syllabus framing workshops, where they contribute in asserting COs in curriculum. At the time of admission, teachers explain POs to the parents and students. The teachers explain the expected outcomes in the initial classes at the same time, they discuss evaluation pattern, weightage and other course-related information in the classroom.

The college aims at holistic development of students. It has been continuously working on the attainments of the outcomes. It focuses to produce very confident learners with sound knowledge, skills, attitudes and values. The college evaluates the attainment of Programme Outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes by conventional as well as non-conventional means. In the conventional means, the Departments analyse the results of the university examinations course wise and report to the Principal, CDC and Governing Council. Continuous Internal Evaluation in the form of tests, seminars and home assignments evaluate the attainment of the skills and knowledge. Students' performance in the class, practical, internal and external evaluation help to measure the Course Outcomes.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

The college has central library building with fully automated with an integrated library management system (ILMS) and CD/DVDs Library Management Software. It spreads in an area of 828 sq. mts. The library is located in a separate two storied building situated very close to the main block. The collection includes more than 100000 books, 58 journals, 26 magazines, 23 newspapers, 515 CD's. The library also houses rich reference Collection viz., Encyclopedia of Master Plots, Encyclopedia Americana, Specific Subject Encyclopedias, Year Books, Atlases before independence magazines are also available and other reference material. Central Library holdings also include Dissertations of M.Phil., Doctoral Thesis of Marathi, Hindi and English. The collection of books include documents covering a wide range of subjects from English literature, Marathi literature, Hindi literature, arts, history and social sciences, books on competitive exam etc. It has a spacious reading hall. The well-furnished reading area can accommodate 100 users at any point of time and provides conductive environment for study. A visitor record is maintained for students and faculty members, New Arrivals of books and journals are displayed on rack. The library has closed circuit television (CCTV) surveillance Cameras. Library has adequate number of terminals to facilitate searching/accessing e-resources, web browsing and for other academic work. Provision has also been made to allow downloading/printing of material from these resources. It has excellent ICT infrastructure with adequate bandwidth for fast and seamless access to Internet. It is also member of DELNET. Initiatives taken by the College are the following:

1. Internet access, download and printout facility have been provided.

2. Organization of Book Exhibitions/Display of new books.

3. Proper system of feedback from users to improve library services.

4. System of recommendation for purchase of books through Departments.

OPAC: The library has developed the database of its own collection through the library software. Library is fully computerized with barcode-based issue-and return process, online public access catalogue (OPAC) facility is made available in the central library.

e-Resources: The library is a member of N-list consortia of information library network (INFLIBNET) under this consortia library provides more than 97000+ e-books and 6000+ e journals to students and faculty member. Internet facility, CD's, DVD, CD-ROM databases, barcode scanner, printer, audio-video unit available in the library.

Library Automation: All the active book collection is update in the library software database and the online public access catalogue (OPAC) is available for students and faculty members. The issue and return of book have been activated in the library software.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed and functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules, and procedures, etc

Response:

The college functions under the aegis of Dayanand Education Society, Latur and is affiliated to SRTMU, Nanded. The Governing Council functions as per the norms of the UGC, the Government of Maharashtra, the Parent University, and the Governing-Body.

College-Development Committee (CDC):

The College Development Committee has been formulated as per existing Maharashtra Public University Act 2016. The composition of CDC involves President, Secretary and seven members of Management, Principal, and Vice-Principal, IQAC coordinator, three Teacher Representatives and one non-teaching staff.

The CDC and IQAC finalize academic, administrative and infrastructural development plans of the college.

The CDC regulates the policies for an effective functioning. The strategies are designed and executed with the active co-operation of all stakeholders.

The IQAC coordinator presents the minutes of IQAC in the meeting of the CDC for information and approval. It reviews academic outcomes and makes plans for expansion in the existing courses and introduces new courses as per requirements and feedback from various stakeholders.

It reviews and approves all the MoUs, linkages and collaborations signed.

Principal:

The Principal implements policy decisions and executes ordinance, academic activities, administrative and infrastructural development plans and resource development activities as per the UGC, State Government and Parent University norms.

Vice-Principal :

The Vice-Principal acts as the Principal in the absence of Principal. He assists the Principal in the implementation of policy decisions and in execution of ordinance, academic activities, administrative and infrastructural development plans and resource development activities as per the UGC, State Government and Parent University norms.

IQAC-Coordinator:

The IQAC-coordinator looks after the tasks of IQAC under the guidance of the CDC. He prepares action plan and academic calendar for each year. He collects feedback from the concerned committee and submits to CDC.

Service Rules and Procedures

There is well maintained record of service rules, procedure, recruitments, promotional policies etc. along with Service Books and personal files. The administrative office communicates all the service rules and changes to the staff from time to time. The Government Resolutions of Government of Maharashtra and Notices of the UGC and the parent University are kept in a file in file for the faculty perusal.

The college is Government aided and posts are filled as per laid down procedure and selection criteria provided by UGC, Department of Higher Education, Maharashtra and Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

• Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff:

The college has well defined and structured mechanism for performance appraisal system for teaching and non-teaching staff. The performance of every employee is assessed after the completion of every academic year. It is assessed by IQAC, instructions are given to the staff and it helps to enhance the efficiently of staff to attain new goals.

For teachers, Performance Based Appraisal System is based on self-review, peer review and feedback from students. The annual assessment of the performance of the teaching staff is done through collection of information from teaching faculty as per norms of UGC and affiliating university generated Proforma known as "Annual Self-assessment for the Performance Based Appraisal System." The other Proforma is provided by the Higher Education Department, Govt. of

Maharashtra referred to as "Form of Annual Confidential Report" (ACR). The overall peer review and evaluation is carried out by the Principal, CDC and IQAC.

For non-teaching staff, there is a system of appraisal. Their skills and performances in the administrative work are judged. The book of worksheet is given to each non-teaching staff for writing the regular work in the college and it is verified by the Office Superintendent.

Furthermore, the result of the appraisal systems are forwarded to the IQAC for systematic assessments of the same. It is put before the CDC for the further necessary action.

Effective Welfare Measures:

1. The institution has a well-established welfare mechanism for both teaching and non-teaching staff.

2. Employees Provident Fund of 50% share is contributed by management of our institute for all non- grant teaching and non-teaching staff as per government rules.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

The institute's playground, Cricket Stadium as well as badminton court are given on rent to sports association in the region for organizing various matches and sport events.

Alumni Association contributes both in form of material and in cash towards student welfare.

The IQAC of the college suggests ways and means for systematic utilization of funds. The funds are properly utilized in time bound manner and utilization certificates are sent to the concerned agencies.

The College has established **Dayanand Art Gallery** where the artifacts made by Fashion and Animation Departments are sold to raise funds.

The internal and external audits are conducted regularly.

The college has a systematic mechanism of internal audit for all the financial activities. The purchase committee purchases the items as per laid down procedure and rules. The principal keeps a strict watch on the purchase system to make the system more robust and transparent. For the major purchases, the bills are perused by the Secretary and the President before final payments.

The accountant of the college maintains all the financial records in accounting Cloud Based ERP CCMS (Centralized Campus Management System) purchased from- Master Soft ERP Solution Pvt. Ltd. Nagpur.

All the vouchers and bills are duly audited by a team of qualified and well experienced Chartered Accountants.

To keep the record transparent and to ensure accountability, the college office prepares the balance sheet clearly indicating the amount spent under different heads during those particular periods and verified by the Office Superintendent and the Principal and audited by the Chartered Accountant.

The external audit report is put before governing body for its perusal and observations.

The college ensures that the audit for maintenance grant and salary of the staff and post metric scholarship to the students received from state government is conducted regularly by the office of Department of Higher Education, Maharashtra. The final audit is done by team of members from AG, Nagpur, Maharashtra.

1. who hardly get an opportunity to express themselves in an innovative way. The rural talent is given an opportunity through FUSION a fashion show case cum sale where not only the students of Fashion Dress Design Department but other students also get a chance to express themselves. The skills of designing, draping, painting, ramp walk etc are given to the students. The products produced by these students are regularly showcased and kept for sale in Dayanand Art Gallery. Every year there is a fashion show arranged to give chance to the students' talent. To arrange the fashion show and exhibition it takes almost 3 to 4 months of preparation and strenuous efforts which include theme selection, designing, draft pattern selection of fabric, embellishments, cutting, stitching and finishing, selection of models, garment trials, Ramp choreography, assembling theme wise rounds, practice, communicating with the other colleges of fashion dress design, asking for deputing their contestants in the State level competition, final rehearsal and the real fashion show. The college also arranges showcase and exhibitions of the products produced by the students during festival seasons like Ganpati festival, Dussehra and Diwali etc. All these are available in the seasonal shoppy named Dayanand Art Gallery. Our students produce eco- friendly Ganpati, eco-friendly diyas and reusable artifacts.

In 2013 14 another FUSION- the showcase of garment presentation was arranged

In 2014-15 FUSION- a classic exhibition cum sale was arranged

In 2016 17 FUSION- a classic exhibition cum sale a was arranged

In 2017-18 we could have a wider reach with organisation of FUSION- a State level competition

FUSION- the showcase of garment presentation was arranged in 2018-19

In 2019 20 FUSION- a classic exhibition cum sale was arranged before the corona pandemic

And in continuation in 2022- 23 FUSION the showcase of garment presentation was arranged

Evidence of Success: Evidence of success was found in the form of successful entrepreneur development among the students. Most of the students established their own boutique and shops. Some of them have joined the Multi- National Companies in India and abroad.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The students from rural area who hardly have any exposure to the modern fashion world hesitate to participate and come on the stage. Specifically, the girl students who have many fantastic ideas feel shy to express themselves. As for resources concerned huge quantity of clothes, models and for the final showcase decoration and ramp are required.

Through this, she will get ten thousand rupees per month and free classical music lessons from Mahesh Kale.

Kumari Swaranjali Panchal also successfully participated.
